You can be sure that a future edition will continue where this one leaves off and grow in depth as information, stories, and photographs are shared.




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Masiowski Family Tree




Kotlarchuk Family Tree



Jan's Family and Early Life

Jan Masiowski also known as "John" was born sometime around April 1884 in the village of Tsyhany, Galicia. John had at least two brothers including one named Joseph who also immigrated. He visited Manitoba until he was deported to the USA and made his home in Chicago. More research is required to learn more about John's parents, siblings, and family.

John was born in the village of Tsyhany (Ukrainian: Цигани, Polish: Cygany) which can be translated to "Gypsy" village. It is important to touch upon this place as both John and Anastasia came from the same village located in Galicia (Ukrainian: Галичина, Polish: Galicja).

Galicia was a historical and geographic region in southeastern Poland and western Ukraine¹. It was the poorest region in the Astro-Hungarian Empire and consequently thousands of Galicians immigrated².

It would be impossible to cover the history of Galicia in this publication but suffice to say it was once part of the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth, the Kingdom of Galicia and Lodomeria, the Austro-Hungarian Empire, the Republic of Poland, the Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic, and Ukraine.

The village of Tsyhany is located in the Borshchiv district, Ternopil oblast, Ukraine on the banks of the Tsyanka river (Цига́нка)³. In 1880 there were 1562 people who lived in the village, in 1900 there were 2267 (an increase of 705 over a span of 20 years), while there are 1304 people who live there today⁴.

On April 24th, 1901 John boarded the *S.S. Assyria*, operated by the Hamburg America Line⁵, in Hamburg, Germany with 463 other souls and sailed to Canada with Michael Chornoboy and family.

The Choronboys are on the passenger list on the S.S. Assyria ⁶⁷. They arrived in Halifax, Nova Scotia on May 6th, 1901 and then headed to Winnipeg. Supposedly John was an orphan⁸, however, more research is required to confirm if his parents had died before he immigrated.

It looks as though there were several families from the village of Tsyhany who traveled on the same ship including Baszczak (Bastchak), Galaj, Hilasz (Helash), Kubyn, Panagabko (Panagapko), Rimiak, and Semczysyn (Semchyshyn).

On the Canadian Passenger List it states that John was 18 years old, a farmer, and his destination was Winnipeg, MB. Some of the other families are also headed to Winnipeg and some even closer like Sifton.

He worked on the railroad and then, later on, he worked for Billy Williams who operated a sawmill in the Mossey River municipality.

In 1903, John settled on section 20, township 29, range 189 10 and would remain here until he later moved the family.

Western Canada was divided into six-by-six-mile blocks called townships which were further sectioned into 1-square mile plots of land defined by the Dominion Land Survey¹¹. The plots were divided into 4



quarters: the northwest (NW), northeast (NE), southeast (SE), and southwest (SW) quarters.

The Cummin's Manitoba Railroad Guide for 1923 identified G. Mashenski on southwest section 20, township 29, and range 18 with no other neighbours on the same section which leads me to believe that the spelling is an error 12.

John became a naturalized Canadian citizen on February 18th, 1907 in Oak Brae.

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

Anastasia's Family and Early Life


Anastasia Kotlarchuk (1891-1976) and her family came from the same village as John, Tsyhany, but left two years earlier in 1899 from Hamburg, Germany on the *S.S. Phoenicia* and arrived in Halifax on May 21st, 1899.

There were 1308 souls on board including 700 adults, 489 children between the ages of 1 and 14, and 119 infants¹³ as well as other families from the same village with the surnames Bilinsky, Caruk, Geleta, Hilarz (Helash), Kryska, Koloduczuk, Papuszak, Paskal (Pascal), and Zurba.



Her parents Fedor Kotlarchuk (1850–1928) "Fred" and Warwara Karawatski (1857–1947) "Barbara", siblings Michael (1875–), Nykola (1878–1957), Anna (1883–1940), Ivan (1885–), Anton (1890–1968), and Katharina (1898–1918), and maternal grandparents Kasko Karawatski (1830–1914) and Maria (1840–1911) came to Canada with them¹⁴.

Her uncle Wasyl (1866-1915) and his wife Tekla and children also traveled with the Karawatskis and also settled in the Mossey River municipality.



In the 1901 Canadian Census, the Kotlarchuks lived in the district of Marquette and the subdistrict of Aberdeen. Some of their neighbors were Bilinsky, Geleta, and Zurba who were families that had traveled on the same ship to Canada with them.



There is a Western Land Grant issued for northeast section 16, township 29, range 19 in Fedor's name (Fedko Kodlartchuk) on July 29th, 1905. This is the same section they lived on in the 1906 Canadian Census where they are listed as Austrians who immigrated in 1899.





The Karawatskis are close by on section 10, township 29, range 19 which in truth is only 1/2 mile south of section 15 and southeast of section 16.


In the 1906 Canadian Census, Anastasia's maternal grandparents lived on the same section as her uncle and his family. Wasyl and Tekla had four children while two were born in Manitoba, Nashta and Marie.

In the 1911 Canadian Census, the Kotlarchuks continued to live on the section of land granted to Fedor in 1905. Anastasia's siblings Anton and

Katharina lived with them as did her grandfather who was now a widower. They were recorded as Rutherians and under religion there's a note that says "Protest. Ind" and whose meaning is unknown at this time.



Kasko passed away of old age on August 22nd, 1914 while his son and daughter-in-law (Wasyl and Tekla) died a year later in 1915 due to tuberculosis.

Wasyl's son, John, and his family kept farming on section 10, township 29, range 19 until they moved before the 1926 Canadian Census and are located in the 1931 Census in Nelson, Manitoba¹⁵.

In the 1916 Canadian Census, Fedor and Warwara live with their son Anton and his wife and son Joseph. Unfortunately, the census record does not identify what section only that it is in township 29, range 19. I doubt the family has moved off of section 16.



In the 1921 Canadian Census, Fedor and Warwara live with Anton and his wife and three sons named Joseph, Alec, and Mike on section 16, township 29, range 19. They are recorded as Greek Catholic Rutherians.

In the 1926 Canadian Census, Fedor and Warwara live with their son Anton and his wife and seven children. They were recorded as being born in Poland while the whole family's mother tongue was Ukrainian.

In the 1931 Canadian Census, Warwara (now a widow) continued to live with her son Anton, his wife, and their seven children in a three-room house worth \$3000 on section 16, township 29, range 19. I suspect that the estimated worth of the homestead is an error with an extra zero and should be \$300 based on the estimates of other homesteads near-by.

On 1928, Anastasia's father Fedor died and on January 22nd, 1947 her mother Warwara died. Their burial plots are currently unknown at this time.

John and Anastasia's Marriage and Family

The story goes that in the spring of 1904, Jan and Anastasia, walked 10 miles to Sifton, Manitoba to be married¹⁶. A home was then built from the lumber that John had cut the previous winter. The homestead grew with a house, barn for horses and cows, one for pigs, and a hen house.


They raised a family of thirteen children (8 boys and 5 girls) named Joseph Alexander (1905–1997), Anton (1906–1925), Agnes (1909–2001), Peter Albert (1910–1991), Helen (1912–2006), Nicola Thomas (1914–1992), Pauline (1916–2006), Jean (1918–2017), Stanley Christopher (1920–2012), Anne Nastia (1922–2024), Frank John (1924–2015), Carl (1929–2005), and Thomas Lawrence (1932–).

In the 1906 Canadian Census, John is on section 20, township 29, range 18 with a wife and child. What is particularly interesting is that his

wife's name is Hanka. It's hard to tell whether her age is 18 or 13 due to the quality of the scan but they had a baby named Josef whose birth-year roughly matches that of John and Anastasia's first son Joseph.

Based on this record, apparently Hanka and Josef were born in Austria and had immigrated in 1902. This is a year off of John's immigration year but you will notice that dates on records typically have a range.

When we reference the Hamburg and Canadian passenger lists, we can be confident John had traveled alone to Canada. Hanka's name is possibly an error, however, Anastasia's name is listed with her parents and siblings in the same Census so it is hard to come to any conclusion.


In the 1911 Canadian Census, the Masiowskis live on the southwest quarter of section 18, township 29, range 18 along with another family named the Robertsons. They are identified as Catholic Rutherians with four children named [Giska] for Joseph, Anton, [???] for Agnes, and [Pytro] for Peter.

In the 1916 Census, the Masiowskis are likely still on the southwest quarter of section 18 but could be on section 20 as the census record only identifies township 29 and range 18. They are identified as Roman Catholic Poles and their naturalization dates have changed.

There are six children in the home and it's interesting to see some of the names have changed to Joe for Joseph, [Aggness] for Agnes, [Helenia] for Helen, and [Polina] for Pauline. Anastasia's name is recorded as Nellie.



In the 1921 Canadian Census, the Masiowskis lived in a two-room house on section 20, township 29, and range 18. They are identified as Roman Catholic Ruthenians and their immigration dates are more accurate.

There are nine children whose names have become more Anglicized to Joseph, Anton, Agnes, Peter, Helen, [Pawlina] for Pauline, [Gynka] for Jean, and [Kasko] for Stanley.

Joseph, then 16, was old enough to work on his father's farm which aligns with the story that he left school by grade 4 to do so.

On October 11th, 1925, Anton Masiowski died. Reportedly he was a sickly child¹⁷ with a deformity on his back.

He was buried at St. Michael's Cemetery¹⁸ which is north of the North Lake School on the southwest portion of section 14, township 29, range 18. The years on his headstone for his birth and death are off by 1 year.

In 1924, John decided to give up the original homestead because there were too many rocks and he was dissatisfied with the land 19. He purchased the north half of section 10, township 29, range 18.

In the 1926 Canadian Census, the Masiowskis are recorded as on this homestead which grew in size with a log barn, grainery, hen house, and pig barn.

This homestead was dilapidated but still standing in 2015.



John and Anastasia were recorded as being born in Poland while the whole family's mother tongue was Ukrainian.

There were ten children named Joseph, Agnes, Peter, Helen, Nicola, Polly, Jennie, Stanley, Annie, and Frank.

In the 1931 Census, the Masiowskis live on the north side of section 10, township 29, range 18. The wooden structure has three rooms (two rooms plus a useable attic) and was worth \$400.

There were nine children named Joe, Peter, Nick, Stanley, Frank, Carl, Polly, Jinny, and Annie. The older boys (Joe, Peter, and Nick) worked on the farm while Frank, Polly, Jinny, and Annie attended school.

John and Anastasia continued to farm the land until they retired in 1946 and moved to Fork River. When their sons Nick and Stan returned from WWII, all seven sons worked together to build them a two-room retirement home in town.

On May 5th, 1954 John and Anastasia celebrated their golden wedding anniversary and received a Papal blessing dated March 21st, 1954.

John passed away at the age of 77 on April 5th, 1961 and is buried in the Fork River Catholic Cemetery.

On July 20th, 1964 Ukrainian-Canadian folklorist Robert Klymasz visited Fork River and recorded 32 songs and stories with Anastasia.

There are 2 songs of hers that have been printed in his books called:

- Ой попід гай зеленький "By the green grove", and
- Там на горбочку там вогонь горе "There's a fire on the hill, there's grief."





The Masiowski Children

The Masiowski children attended Mowat School No. 1232 and later North Lake School No. 1431. The distance from the Masiowski farm to the Mowat School was 3 and $\frac{1}{2}$ miles while the distance to the North Lake School after they moved was only $\frac{3}{4}$ a mile²⁰.

Joseph Alexander was born on February 8th, 1905 and attended the Mowat School until grade 4 when it was expected he would work on the farm.

He married Anne Demczyszyn (1913-2003) on July 19th, 1931. This occurred after the 1931 Canadian Census was taken so Joe is still listed as living with his parents and siblings.

In 1933 they purchased northwest section 1, township 29, range 18 and built a house and barn. They farmed there until they sold it in 1974 and moved to Winnipegosis, Manitoba.


They had four children named Elizabeth (1932-), Violet (1935-), Edward Victor (1932-2020), and Geraldine. Joseph passed away on October 2nd, 1997 and his wife passed in 2003. They are buried at the Winnipegosis Roman Catholic Cemetery.

Agnes was born between 1908 and 1909 and attended the Mowat School. She married Clarence Slater (1907-1991), likely in Saskatchewan between 1926 and 1930. I have been unable to find a digital record from Manitoba Vital Statistics and Saskatchewan Vital Statistics do not have any digital records available.

The couple and their oldest son Ken lived as lodgers with the Goulden family on section 1, township 41, range 23, meridian 2. Clarence was a labourer on the farm while Agnes was a homemaker.

Clarence predeceased his wife by ten years and Agnes passed away at the age of 93 years old on March 5th, 2001 in Humboldt, Saskatchewan. They are buried at in Humboldt Public Cemetery²¹.

The had a homestead on northeast section 10, township 29, range 18 until they moved to northeast section 11, township 28, range 19.



Nicola Thomas was born February 3rd, 1914 and attended the Mowat and North Lake Schools.

In 1940, he joined the Lake Superior Regiment and served in France, Belgium, Holland, and Germany. He rode his Bren-gun Carrier through all these countries and arrived on May 8th, 1945 for the V-E Day Parade in Bad Zwischenahn, Germany²⁶.

His regimental number was H-46118 and his name as well as his brother's, Stanley, were published in several articles of the Dauphin Herald for this time.



Nick settled in Winnipegosis after the war and worked at a variety of odd jobs until he became a cook in drill camps with Mid-West Drilling²⁷. He retired to Winnipegosis and in 1992 moved to Dauphin where he passed away on October 27th, 1992 and is buried in Riverside Cemetery²⁸.

Pauline was born April 9th, 1916 and attended the Mowat and North Lake Schools and Fork River High School.

During WWII she worked at a munitions factory until 1942. Later, she worked as a nurse's aide.

She married James Henderson Johnston (1913-1981) on October 23rd, 1943 in Dauphin, Manitoba.



She lived on the Johnston homestead and had six children named James Franklin, Larry, Robert, Wayne, Marilyn, and Maureen.

Stanley Christopher was born
October 15th, 1920 and attended
North Lake School until grade 8.

He joined Royal Canadian
Engineers (R.C.E.) of the Armed
Forces in 1941 and was part of the
8th Canadian Field Squadron
sweeping for mines and building
bridges. He trained in Portage La
Prairie, Dundurn, Chilliwack, and
other places in BC.

In 1944, Stanley was seriously wounded while building a bridge in Moerstraten, Netherlands. He was sent to Brussels to be operated on and then England to recover.

Like his older brother, Nick, Stanley ended up in Bad Zwischenahn, Germany³⁰ for the V-E Day Parade. Afterwards, he spent time in Raalte, Netherlands during the summer where he met his future wife. In the fall of 1945, he married a Dutch girl named Anita (1925-1978) in Zwolle, Overijssel, Netherlands. They had three children named Stanley Jr., Bev, and Hermien.

In 1947 they bought southeast section 10, township 29, range 18 and had 220 acres by 1953. Later, they moved to Flin Flon and rented the farm before they sold it.

Frank John was born August 22nd, 1924 and attended the North Lake School and served in the Fort Garry Horse Military Cadets.

He married Ethel Chornoboy (1932-) in 1951 in Rorkton, Manitoba. They had 4 children named Frank "Frankie" Gerald (1951-1957), Deborah Lynne, Arlene, and Bradley John.

They farmed in North Lake and then managed a general store in Sifton. Frank also worked for Ontario Hydro in Minaki, Ontario.

While driving across a frozen lake a truck with Frank and 19 others fell through the ice. Frank was 1 of only 5 survivors of this accident³³.

Frank and family also lived in Thompson, Ninette (where they owned a café), and Winnipeg.



He was a heavy equipment operator and held build the 1951 floodway, the road from Grandview to Baldy Mountain, and streets in Thompson.
